DEVOTIONS TO OUR LADY OF FATIMA





REFLECTIONS BY CATHERINE DOHERTY

Priests: A Sign of Hope

When I was in Toronto I had a spiritual director, Father Keating, a Jesuit, who lived not far from friendship House. I heard that his doctor ordered him to walk every day. So I said, "Father, since you have to walk, why not walk in the slums—right here? He said, "I should go out to the park or someplace away from here." I said "there is Cameron Street here, filled with Communists." he looked at me and said, "So what do you want me to do?" I said, "Why not walk on Cameron Street? You will bring hope to people, because a priest brings hope—just your walking down these streets, especially Cameron Street." he said, "Okay, I'll walk, but I don't quite believe I am a sign of hope." I said, "the Lord will show you." Every day after that I saw him walk the slums, especially Cameron Street. He was pelted with a few rocks and had remarks, but he was fifty, six-foot-one, and strong—he had presence. One day a woman ran out, looked around to see if anybody was watching, they whispered, "Pray for my son. He is very sick." About a week later, she came, standing straight and not running, not afraid of anybody. She took Father's hand and kissed it according to the beautiful Slavonic custom, and said, "My son is well, thanks to your prayers."

When priests are around, they are a sign of hope. They may not feel they are, or even know that they are, but they are.

ST. STANISLAUS OF JESUS AND MARY PAPCZYNSKI - Feast Day: May 18th



St. Stanislaus pczyński, M.I.C. (18 May 1631 - 17 September 1701), born Jan Papczyński, was Polish Roman Catholic priest who founded the Marians of the Immaculate Conception, the first Polish religious order for men. Prior to starting his own order, he had been a member of the Piarist Order. He took the name of "Stanislaus of Jesus and Mary". Papczyński is widely remembered as a prolific religious writer; his writings include works such as *The Mystical Temple of God*.

He was beatified on 16 September 2007 in Poland by Cardinal Tarcisio Bertone on the behalf of Pope Benedict XVI. Pope Francis approved a miracle attributed to him on 21 January 2016 which allowed for him to be canonized. On 15 March 2016 a consistory of cardinals scheduled his canonization to take place on 5 June 2016, which was celebrated in Saint Peter's Square.

From the last will and testament of Stanislaus Papczyński

"I give thanks to the Divine Majesty for graces, gifts, and goodness granted me with great generosity. I repent from the depth of my heart and I wish out of love of the Lord to repent more and more for all my sins, which I place in the deepest wounds of Jesus Christ, my Lord and Redeemer. I fall at the feet of Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God, and I give myself with the entire Congregation of her Immaculate Conception to her for eternity. I call on her gracious direction and effective care, and for the hour of my death I beg her most merciful and powerful protection from the ambushes of my enemies and all temporal and eternal Evil.

To all those who loved and supported the Congregation of the Immaculate Conception (which I founded through God's inspiration to support all the faithful departed), I promise double reward from God's hand.

I eagerly suggest to my brethren, if it be appropriate for me to say: Sons, you ought to have love for God and neighbor, devotion to the Catholic faith, and worship, love, and obedience to the Holy See, faithful preservation of the vows, humility, patience, support the souls in purgatory, and be at peace with everyone."



ST. PASCHAL BAYLON - Feast Day: May 17th

Paschal Baylon was born on May 16, 1540 in Torrehermosa to the poor peasant Martin and his wife Elizabeth Jubera. The fact that he was born on Pentecost led to his parents naming him as "Paschal". He had at least two older siblings. His first words were the names of Jesus Christ and the Blessed Virgin.

Each time his mother carried him to the Church he kept looking at the Blessed Sacrament. His parents once feared he was kidnapped after he was lost but found him climbing the altar steps on his knees so that he could see the tabernacle. He spent his childhood as a shepherd from age seven until he was 24. But as he toiled in the fields he remained attentive to the ringing of the Church bell which rang during the Elevation during Holy Mass. His outreach to others was commendable for he once offered to provide compensation to the owners of crops damaged due to his animals being let loose. He would carry a book with him and often begged those who passed along the path to teach him the alphabet and to read; as he toiled in the fields he would read religious texts to deepen his faith. But his friends were not devout as he but Paschal served as a positive influence on them. His friends used bad language often but learnt to hold their tongue in his presence since his friends respected his pious nature and his virtue. In 1564 he joined the Reformed Franciscans as a religious brother and commenced his period of novitiate on February 2nd 1564 before making his profession a year later in Orito at Saint Joseph convent. He was urged to become an ordained priest but he felt that was not the path for him. He chose to live in poor monasteries because he said: "I was born poor and am resolved to die in poverty and penance". His jobs included serving as a cook and porter as well as the gardener and the official beggar who went around asking for alms. He lived this life in contemplation and silent meditation and often did this as he worked. He was a contemplative and had frequent ecstatic visions, spending some nights before the altar in silence. His superior sent him to France in 1576 to have him defend the Real Presence against the blasphemies of a Calvinist preacher. But he was despised there and was almost killed after a Huguenot mob chased him out. Those chasing him hurled stones and dirt at him causing him to break his shoulder and become bruised.

The humble friar never wasted food. The end of each week saw him eat a few boiled vegetables which had been soaked in water with the terrible smelling weed known as wormwood. He often ate scraps from the kitchen. Other austerities included wearing a coat with steel spikes or a patched habit including one tunic lined with rough pig hair designed to cause discomfort. Sometimes he slept out in the cold. He died in mid-1592 after being taken ill.

His tomb in Villarreal became an immediate place of pilgrimage and there were soon miracles that were reported at his tomb. Pope Paul V beatified him on 29 October 1618 while Pope Alexander VIII canonized him later on 16 October 1690. He was enlisted in the Church's struggle against Modernism and Pope Leo XIII proclaimed him the "seraph of the Eucharist" as well as the patron of Eucharistic congresses and affiliated associations.

This is a definitive biography of fr. Vincent Robert Capodanno, a chaplain for the Marine Corps during the Vietnam war. Greatly beloved by so many who served under his spiritual care, Fr. Capodanno died on the field of battle giving the last rites to the US soldiers he served so well. He was just declared a "Servant of God" by the Vatican, which is the first major step toward canonization of a saint.

He truly embodied the ideal of "dying to yourself" in the service of others, and inspired that ideal in all those around him. Fr.
